CHANUKAH MESSAGE By Rabbi Aaron A. Rabenstein

The Chanukah story has its climax in the small town of Modin, a small hamlet in the hills away from Jerusalem. There, we are told, Mattathais took a sword and inflicted the fatal stab against idolatry and immorality, the basis of the Hellenistic culture. This action was enough to ignite the flame of victory over the Hellenists and their culture.

Mattathais was not a young rebel but an old sage who felt the moment had come to defend G-d and his Torah. It was this priest who gave the younger men, the Maccabees the impetus and courage to fight the alien culture.

It is not always the young who lead the way for causes but often the elders blaze the path for our youth by their positive actions. Probably it is when there is a combination of youthful exuberance and elderly reason when a certain purpose becomes resolved. This is why Mattathais and his sons were successful in their actions.

This may be the message which the episode in our history may wish to teach us, that youth and age must work together to successfully achieve optimum goals in Judaism. One will fail without the other but one will succeed *with* the other.

May our Chanukah light burn brightly throughout the year - Good Chanukah!
