ROSH HASHONOH 5729

Rosh Hashonoh is known as the Day of Remembrance, and Yom Kippur is called the Day of Judgment. As the Jew welcomes the year 5729, he stands before His Creator to be remembered and judged for a year of health and blessings.

In an era of social upheaval almost all over the world, unparalleled progress in technology and medicine, at a time when speed seems to be the outstanding medium, one can only reflect and ask himself, where am I truly going? What is the rush? What is happening with time?

In these times of our economical well-being it is well to recall the statement of a philosopher; "Man's ability to meditate decreases with the increase of his material wealth."

Is this not the proper time of the year as we stand before the L-rd during these awe inspiring days of soul-searching and meditation to reflect about ourselves?
