However, we must realize that some contrition is also necessary in order to reach the Omnipotent. Let us therefore fill our hearts with penitence and scrutinize our own ways and deeds and that of our religious leaders. It may be that we are disqualified to appear as advocates before the Almighty, this New Year.

It is written, "On thy walls oh Jerusalem, have I placed watchmen." We were appointed to guard over the safety of the fortress containing our holy heritage. We are the trustees of that heritage and that trusteeship carries with it definite responsibilities.
