

Golf Manor Plans Gala Party To Celebrate 75th Anniversary



Clark St. Synagogue

Nostalgia will be the order of the day as Golf Manor Synagogue celebrates its 75th anniversary with a cocktail party and dinner on Sunday, May 23, commencing at 6:30 p.m.

The Anshe Sholom (Roumanian) formed a mutual aid society known as "Harmony" in 1901 and purchased their first home at 421 Clark Street in 1922, shown in photo above. The founding date of Bnai Jacob (Polish) is unknown, but their home was on Clinton and Cutter Sts.

In 1932, the Bnai Jacob purchased a church building at 521 Forest Avenue and the Anshe Sholom merged with them and moved into that building in 1934, under the name of Beth Hakeneseth Agudas Israel.

In April 1952, Rabbi David Indich assumed the role of Spiritual Leader of what had become known as the Forest Avenue Synagogue. In 1957, when it became evident that Avondale was no longer the

focal point of the Jewish community, land was acquired and a new home constructed in Golf Manor. The present sanctuary was built in 1967.

A special musical portraying our joint history will be presented at the gala affair.
