



Tri-Synagogue Adult Education Institute Will Open April 12

The Tri Synagogue Council, comprised of Golf Manor, Roselawn and New Hope, will present the Spring semester of its Adult Education Institute, Wednesday, April 12, through May 24.

Classes will meet every Wednesday (except April 19) at 8 p.m. for two one-hour sessions of intensive Jewish instruction.

Courses are; Basic Hebrew, Conversational Hebrew, Bible Study, Liturgy, Code of Jewish Law and Ethics. Each subject is taught by experts.


The opening session, a public lecture, will be at
