Hillel Meeting

Want to get a job? Want to know what fields your best opportunities lie in? Want to know what your best field is? Want to know what you as a Jew are up against? The Jewish Vocational Service is prepared to answer these questions. Mr. Abe Jacobs of the Service explained its work to Hillel.

As part of its work, Mr. Jacobs said that everyone is welcome to come for an interview at the Jewish Center. The counselling service takes about four or five meetings to discuss your background, to take tests to determine interests and abilities, to explain thoroughly the outlook on jobs. The tests are imperfect, but are a help. The Service makes literature on the different occupations available, and will arrange a study group in a certain subject if enough people are interested in it.

Another purpose of the JVS is its work against discrimination against Jews in jobs. These are some of the reasons found for not giving a Jew a job even though he is as qualified as someone else:

Jews disclose confidential matters.

Jews have a semetic appearance that drives away the customers.

Jews can't do heavy work.

Jews cause labor trouble.

Jews once in the business want to run it.

Jews are inconsiderate and loud.

Employers don't like to pay

Jews low wages.

Jewish girls marry earlier and leave jobs sooner.

Mr. Jacobs told Hillel that there is need in the special work fields--medicine, teaching, nursing, library work, research, and in government positions. Since the Jew is always the last to be hired and the first to be discharged, Mr. Jacobs said that a Jew should not be afraid to take dirty hand jobs such as a position as a mechanic.
